DELEGATION

Ronald McDonald House 2019 Even Partnership Opportunities – Oreen Skiba

Oreen Skiba, Stakeholder Relations Manager, stated that the Ronald McDonald House works to alleviate the financial and emotional burdens of the families of sick children. She stated that in 2017 Lakeland families spent a total of 924 nights at the Ronald McDonald House in Edmonton, while their children were undergoing treatment, and it is estimated that the foundation saved \$165,000.00 in accommodation and transportation costs for these families. She stated that they now have a Lakeland Fuel Program, where every time patients must travel to appointments their parents are given a \$100.00 fuel card, and they have given out 40 of these cards since the program was implemented. She stated that local events provide critical funding to support the programs they offer.

Marcy Farrer, House Mom and Committee Member, stated that in 2006 her daughter was diagnosed with a critical illness, and they spent nine months at the Ronald McDonald House. She also stated that with the Winterland Invitational Hockey Tournament has increased the number of teams from 24 teams last year to 36 teams this year, and along with using the ice in Bonnyville and Glendon, they have added an ice surface in Elk Point as well. It is estimated that this tournament will bring 550 families to Bonnyville and area.

A short video of the 2017 Winterland Invitational was shown to Council.

Oreen Skiba stated that although they are increasing the number of teams to 36 this year, the goal is to eventually have 100 teams participate in this event within 5-6 years. She stated that last year the Town gave \$5,000.00 and this year she is asking for an increase in the donation to \$8,000.00.

Councillor Colbourne asked if they have done an Economic Impact study for this event.

Oreen Skiba replied that they have not, but it is something she has been looking into.

Mayor Sobolewski thanked Oreen and Marcy and they left the meeting at 6:10 p.m.

Bonnyville Curling Club

Sammie Mare stated that she was pleased to inform Council that the Curling Club did receive a grant to repair their roof and the repairs are now complete. She stated that they were also successful in some smaller grants to help with other projects as well. She provided Council with their income statement and advised that they did not do a Casino fundraiser this year, as they are not eligible to do another Casino Fundraiser until

2020. She stated that the Club broke even last year despite the Oilman's Curling Bonspiel not continuing. She also added that the Funspiel will be held again this year; they have 8 ladies' teams, 12 men's' teams, 12 mixed teams and 35 junior curlers signed up to start in January for the Sunday afternoon league for a total of 163 members as of today. They also have 4 Christmas parties booked already for this year, as well as the Senior Winter Games using the ice as well during their event.

Charles Michaud stated that the mortgage on the renovation is now completed, so that is one less expense.

Mayor Sobolewski thanked Sammi Mare and Charles Michaud for their presentation, and they left the meeting at 6:16 p.m.

Mental Health Navigator

Chantal Vallee, Nurse Practitioner, stated that the Bonnyville Child & Adolescent Mental Health Collaborative is a large collaborative between eleven local schools, Covenant Health, AHS North Zone Addictions & Mental Health, the Nurse Practitioner and Doctors, and the Mental Health Navigator. The program has lost two doctors, due to them moving out of town, however, they have recruited 4 more physicians to join the team. They have also had an additional Mental Health Therapist join the team, which makes two. The program holds clinics once a week and from June 2016 to August 2018 they have had 273 referrals, 218 intakes, 163 discharges, 28 returns, and the average stay was 3.8 months. Current caseload is 60 clients. Currently they are booking new intake clients for January.

Alena Thompson, Mental Health Navigator, stated that they are continuing with education and some of the programs running include: Parent education evening sessions once a month, speaking at parent-teacher interview nights, Mental Wellness Day 2019, professional development for clinical and school teams, a website for youth and families, lending library, pamphlets and treatment plans, Go Girl, BEE Café, and Wellness Coalition.

Chantelle Vallee stated that this year it was recognized that teenage boys have shown an interest in their programs and there is a potential for boys who are diagnosed to have a mentorship group next year with funding through Family Support for Children with Disabilities (FSCD) .

Alena Thompson stated that this was the second year for Summer Camp and there were 29 campers in total; Notre Dame Elementary School donated the space and use of their kitchen for no charge. AHS did an evaluation of the services and all reports were extremely positive.



Mental Health Navigator

The strategic plan for the program includes: free family counseling and supports, increase numbers of primary care providers to add clinic days, cannabis education and safety, overdose awareness and psychiatry access. CMHA Rural Mental Health Project application has been submitted to FCSS and eMental Health online support project intent has been submitted.

Mayor Sobolewski asked if they have secured funding from AHS.

Chantal Vallee stated that they have secured funding until 2021 from AHS and the PCN but the success of the program is still contingent on the ongoing financial support from the Town and M.D. of Bonnyville.

Mayor Sobolewski thanked Chantal and Alena for their presentation.

Library

Ina Smith, Library Director, stated that the Library is a space of entertainment and recreation for the Lakeland and they currently have 1300 active patrons. The Bonnyville Library is one of the busiest libraries in the Northern Lights Library System. This year they have supervised over 100 Distance Education exams, they had a Family Literacy Night in February, they have School Outreach programs, and had 150 participants in the Summer Reading Program. This year she indicated they are looking for a 2% increase in salaries and benefits for the 2019 budget. Courier costs are increasing from \$15.00/day to \$17.00/day, Programming went up \$500.00 for 2019 and Janitorial went up to \$700.00/month for 2019. They are asking for a \$0.10 per capita increase from the Town and a \$1.00 per capita increase from the M.D. of Bonnyville.

Chantal Vallee and Alena Thompson, Mental Health Navigator, and Garry Peterson left the meeting at 6:40 p.m.

Councillor Prevost asked if this budget had been presented to the Library Board and approved.

Ina Smith stated that it had been approved by the Board.

Mark Power, CAO, asked what their plan is if the M.D. of Bonnyville says no to the \$1.00 increase.

Ina Smith stated that the Capital Expenses will probably have to go, however, she is hopeful they can make up some of it with donations.

Mayor Sobolewski thanked Ina for her presentation.



Bonnyville Regional Fire Authority

Jay Melvin, Deputy Fire Chief, presented the budget for the Regional Fire Authority. He explained that the contracted cost is the cost to the Town for services, which is about 22-23% of the total budget. Items of note include: slight increase in fire prevention programs due to public demand, annual testing of equipment, phase one of the HVAC equipment replacement at the fire hall, Disaster Services Municipal Services Plan will be completed this year, the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) will be outfitted at the Town Office, 911 Services are continually upgrading to comply with the CRTC changes that have to be implemented by 2023, and will include things like text to 911 and video to 911.

Garry Peterson returned to the meeting at 6:56 p.m.

Jay Melvin stated that they are looking to purchase a new ambulance and have decided to purchase one with a $\frac{3}{4}$ ton chassis as this would hold up better with our rural roads and hopefully cut down on repair costs. Should they go this route, they will be asking both the Town and the M.D. of Bonnyville for an extra \$25,000.00 each to cover the extra cost.

Mayor Sobolewski asked if there needs to be pressure put on AHS as they fund only three or four ambulances, and we need five in order to have coverage for when vehicles are down for repairs.

Jay Melvin stated that the problem is depreciation on the vehicles has not changed since 2009, and today 7 years is too long considering the miles and wear and tear that is put on the current vehicles.

Mayor Sobolewski thanked Jay Melvin for this presentation.

FCSS

David Beale, Community Services Director, stated that the presentation he had provided looks at Revenue, how the FCSS is funded, and Expenses, how the FCSS spends that funding. FCSS revenues are made up of FCSS Provincial funds (64%), FCSS Municipal portion (16%), External Grants (13%), Program Revenues (5%) and Rental Income from the Daycare, the Dance Club and occasional rentals of Gym (3%).

Jay Melvin, Deputy Fire Chief, and Renee Stoyles, Director of Finance left the meeting at 7:03 p.m.

David Beale stated that expenses include Labour costs (58%), Community Grants (7%), Building Operations (15%), FCSS Programs (12%) and Family Community Safety Program Grant (7%).



FCSS

David Beale stated the budget was approved at the September 20th, 2018 FCSS Board meeting.

Renee Stoyles, Director of Finance returned to the meeting at 7:06 p.m.

Mark Power, CAO, stated that a line by line detail of the budgets will be available to Council at the next Council meeting.

Councillor Storoschuk added that it was confirmed at the AUMA Conference that there would be no decrease in FCSS funding for the next three years.

Mayor Sobolewski thanked David for his presentation.

C2 – Capital Plan

Todd Muir, Bonnyville & District Centennial Centre General Manager, introduced himself to those on Council whom he has not met yet. He updated Council on a project they are working on. One project is to remove the wall on the west of the RJ Lalonde Arena and replace it with 4 retractable glass doors and have a drink rail installed where the top row of seating is. This would open up the area for watching hockey games, and still give them the ability to close the glass doors to hold private functions or meetings on the other side. The other project is on the south west entrance stairs and ramp improved. They will remove the ramp and install an electric lift, which they already have that is not being used. The cost for this is estimated to be around \$325,000.00.

Mayor Sobolewski asked if the \$325,000.00 would be split between the Town and the M.D.

Todd Muir stated that the ask is for half from each municipality.

Councillor Prevost asked if there was money in Reserves for this.

Renee Stoyles, Director of Finance, stated that there was \$291,825.00 in the C2 Operating Reserves.

Councillor Storoschuk asked what was going to be done for the sponsors who have their names on the existing wall, since they are the ones who paid for it.

Todd Muir stated that they will be working with those sponsors to give some options of where they can have their logos displayed in the new area.

Councillor McEvoy stated he was concerned about removing seating, as when the C2 holds special events, they have to

apply for special permits as there is not enough seating currently.

Todd Muir stated that the new plan will actually increase seating capacity, with the tables being at the top.

Councillor Van Brabant asked how wide the retractable doors were.

Todd Muir stated that four doors will fit on the whole wall, given that there will be some portions of the wall that have to remain as they will be support walls for the doors.

Mayor Sobolewski thanked Todd Muir for his presentation and Todd Muir, Ina Smith and David Beale left the meeting at 7:24 p.m.
