Management's Responsibility for the Consolidated Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these consolidated financial statements in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these consolidated financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the consolidated financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the consolidated financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Opinion

#### **Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements**

#### Year Ended December 31, 2013

#### Significant accounting policies

The consolidated financial statements of the municipality are the representations of management prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for local governments established by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. Significant aspects of the accounting polices adopted by the municipality are as follows:

#### Reporting entity

The consolidated financial statements reflect the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenditures, changes in fund balances and change in financial position of the reporting entity. This entity is comprised of the municipal operations plus all of the organizations that are owned or controlled by the municipality and are, therefore, accountable to Council for the administration of their financial affairs and resources. Included with the municipality are the following:

Town of Bonnyville Fire Department

Town of Bonnyville Waterworks System

Town of Bonnyville Library Board

Town of Bonnyville Waste Disposal Enterprise

The schedule of taxes levied also includes requisitions for education, health, social and other external organizations that are not part of the municipal reporting entity.

The statements exclude trust assets that are administered for the benefit of external parties. Interdepartmental and organizational transactions and balances are eliminated.

#### Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. The accrual basis of accounting records revenue as it is earned and measurable. Expenses are recognized as they are incurred and measurable based upon receipt of goods or services and/or the legal obligation to pay.

Funds from external parties and earnings thereon restricted by agreement or legislation are accounted for as deferred revenue until used for the purpose specified.

Government transfers, contributions and other amounts are received from third parties pursuant to legislation, regulation or agreement and may only be used for certain programs, in the completion of specific work, or for the purchase of tangible capital assets. In addition, certain user charges and fees are collected for which the related services have yet to be performed. Revenue is recognized in the period when the related expenses are incurred, services performed or the tangible capital assets are acquired.

Property tax revenue is recognized when the tax is levied.

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#### **Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements**

#### Year Ended December 31, 2013

#### 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

#### Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenue and expenditure during the period. Where measurement uncertainty exists, the financial statements have been prepared within reasonable limits of materiality. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash and cash equivalents. The carrying amounts approximate fair value because they have maturities at the date of purchase of less than ninety days.

#### Investments

Investments are recorded at amortized cost. Investment premiums and discounts are amortized on the net present value basis over the term of the respective investments. When there has been a loss in value that is other than a temporary decline, the respective investment is written down to recognize the loss.

#### Debt charges recoverable

Debt charges recoverable consist of amounts that are recoverable from municipal agencies or other local governments with respect to outstanding debentures or other long term debt pursuant to annexation orders or joint capital undertakings. These recoveries are recorded at a value that equals the offsetting portion of the unmatured long term debt, less actuarial requirements for the retirement of any sinking fund debentures.

#### Requisition over-levy and under-levy

Over-levies and under-levies arise from the difference between the actual property tax levy made to cover each requisition and the actual amount requisitioned.

If the actual levy exceeds the requisition, the over-levy is accrued as a liability and property tax revenue is reduced. Where the actual levy is less than the requisition amount, the under-levy is accrued as a receivable and as property tax revenue.

Requisition tax rates in the subsequent year are adjusted for any over-levies or under-levies of the prior year.

#### Inventories for resale

Inventories of materials and supplies for consumption are valued at the lower of cost or net realizable value with cost determined by the average cost method.

#### Year Ended December 31, 2013

#### 1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

#### Local improvements

Construction and borrowing costs associated with local improvement projects are recovered through annual special assessments during the period of the related borrowings. These levies are collectable from property owners for work performed by the municipality. The local improvements are recognized as revenue in the period that the related borrowings are advanced.

#### Landfill closure and post-closure liability

Pursuant to the Alberta Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act, the municipality is required to fund the closure of its landfill site and provide for post-closure care of the facility. Closure and post-closure activities include the final clay cover, landscaping, as well as surface and ground water monitoring, leachate control, and visual inspection. The requirement is being provided for over the estimated remaining life of the landfill site based on usage.

#### Government transfers

Government transfers are the transfer of assets from senior levels of government that are not the result of an exchange transaction, are not expected to be repaid in the future, or the result of a direct financial return.

Government transfers are recognized in the financial statements as revenue in the period in which events giving rise to the transfer occur, providing the transfers are authorized, any eligibility criteria have been met, and reasonable estimates of the amounts can be determined.

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#### **Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements**

#### Year Ended December 31, 2013

#### Significant accounting policies (continued)

#### Non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are not available to discharge existing liabilities and are held for use in the provision of services. They have useful lives extending beyond the current year and are not intended for sale in the normal course of operations. The change in non-financial assets during the year, together with the excess of revenues over expenses, provides the consolidated Change in Net Financial Assets (Debt) for the year.

#### a) Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost which includes all amounts that are directly attributable to acquisition, construction, development or betterment of the asset. The cost, less residual value, of the tangible capital assets is amortized on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life as follows:

Land improvements	15-20
Buildings	25-50
Engineered structures	
Water system	35-65
Wastewater system	35-65
Other engineered structures	15-40
Machinery and equipment	5-20
Vehicles	3-20

Amortization is not charged in the year of acquisition. Full amortization is charged in the year of disposal. Assets under construction are not amortized until the asset is available for productive use.

#### b) Contributions of tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets received as contributions are recorded at fair value at the date of receipt and are recorded as revenue.

#### c) Leases

Leases are classified as capital or operating leases. Leases which transfer substantially all of the benefits and risks incidental to ownership of property are accounted for as capital leases. All other leases are accounted for as operating leases and the related lease payments are charged to expenses as incurred.

#### d) Inventories

Inventories held for consumption are recorded at the lower of cost and replacement cost.

#### e) Cultural and historical tangible capital assets

Works of art for display are not recorded as tangible capital assets but are disclosed.

#### 2. Adoption of recent accounting pronouncements

The following new accounting standards have been issued by the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA). These sections are effective for fiscal periods beginning on or after April 1, 2012 and have been applied retroactively.

#### Section PS 3410 - Government Transfers

This section establishes standards on how to account for and report government transfers to individuals, organizations, and other governments from both a transferring government and a recipient government perspective. There was no significant effect of adopting this accounting policy on the 2013 financial statements. This standard was adopted as it was issued by the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA).

#### Section PS 3510 - Tax Revenue

This new standard establishes recognition, measurement, presentation, and disclosure standards relating to tax revenue reported in financial statements. The effects of adopting this new standard have been outlined in Note 21 to the financial statements. This standard was adopted as it was issued by the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA).

#### 3. Recent accounting pronouncements published but not yet adopted

The following accounting standards have been issued by the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) but are not yet effective. The municipality is currently evaluating the effect of adopting these standards on their financial statements.

#### Section PS 3260 - Liability for Contaminated Sites

This new section establishes recognition, measurement, and disclosure standards for liabilities relating to contaminated sites of governments and those organizations applying the CICA Public Sector Accounting Handbook. This section is effective for fiscal periods beginning on or after April 1, 2014.

#### Section PS 3450 - Financial Instruments

The new section establishes standards for recognizing and measuring financial assets, financial liabilities and non-financial derivatives. In conjunction with this new section, section PS 1201 and section PS 2601 have been amended as a consequence of the introduction of new financial instruments standards. These amendments were required to present the associated gains and losses with financial instruments recognized under the new section. The new section and the related amendments are effective for fiscal periods beginning on or after April 1, 2016.

Deferred grant revenue consists of funding received from MSI Capital (\$74,263) STIP (\$592,649), BMTG (\$343,718), Tourism grant (\$8,480), FCSS (\$26,474), Seniors Housing (\$30,000), Policing Grant (\$25,000), and Municipal Affairs (\$122,569). The use of these funds is restricted to eligible projects, as approved under the funding agreements. Unexpended funds related to the advance are supported by investments held exclusively for these projects (Note 4).

#### Landfill closure and post-closure liability

Alberta environmental law requires closure and post-closure care of landfill sites, which includes final covering and landscaping, pumping of ground water and leachates from the site, and ongoing environmental monitoring, site inspections and maintenance.

During 2013, the Town made payments totaling \$627,584 (2012 - \$311,937) to the Beaver River Regional Waste Management Commission. Effective April 1, 2009, the municipality is under contract to the Commission to operate the Class III landfill and transfer station site.

The municipality conducts ongoing environmental monitoring, site inspections and maintenance of the Class II landfill site which has already been closed. The Town has not designated assets for settling closure and post-closure liabilities of the new Class III site. The life expectancy of the new site is in excess of 40 years.

The current portion of the long term debt amounts to \$897,837 (2012 - \$776,104).

Debenture debt is repayable to the Alberta Capital Finance Authority, Bonnyville Agricultural Society, and Beau Vista JV Inc. and bears interest at rates ranging from 0% to 10.75% per annum and matures in periods 2014 through 2036. The average annual interest rate is 3.49% for 2013 and 3.49% for 2012. For qualifying debentures, the Province of Alberta rebates 60% of interest in excess of 8%, 9% and 11% to a maximum annual rate of 12.5%, depending on the date borrowed. Debenture debt is issued on the credit and security of the Town of Bonnyville at large.

Interest on long term debt amounted to \$491,963 (2012 - \$373,469).

The municipality's total cash payments for interest in 2013 were \$485,645 (2012 - \$345,064).

The debt limit is calculated at 1.5 times revenue of the municipality (as defined in Alberta Regulation 255/00) and the debt service limit is calculated at 0.25 times such revenue. Incurring debt beyond these limitations requires approval by the Minister of Municipal Affairs. These thresholds are guidelines used by Alberta Municipal Affairs to identify municipalities that could be at financial risk if further debt is acquired. The calculation taken alone does not represent the financial stability of the municipality. Rather, the financial statements must be interpreted as a whole.

#### 16. Local authorities pension plan

Employees of the municipality participate in the Local Authorities Pension Plan (LAPP), which is one of the plans covered by the Alberta Public Sector Pension Plans Act. The LAPP serves about 224,000 people and 428 employers. The LAPP is financed by employer and employee contributions and by investment earnings of the LAPP Fund.

Contributions for current service are recorded as expenditures in the year in which they become due.

The municipality is required to make current service contributions to the LAPP of 10.43% of pensionable earnings up to the year's maximum pensionable earnings under the Canada Pension Plan and 14.47% on pensionable earnings above this amount. Employees of the municipality are required to make current service contributions of 9.43% of pensionable salary up to the year's maximum pensionable salary and 13.47% on pensionable salary above this amount.

Total current service contributions by the municipality to the LAPP in 2013 were \$307,712 (2012 - \$278,056). Total current service contributions by the employees of the municipality to the Local Authorities Pension Plan in 2013 were \$280,049 (2012 - \$251,682).

At December 31, 2012, the LAPP disclosed an actuarial deficiency of \$4.977 billion.

#### 17. Commitments

The Hammons local improvement has not been completed. An additional debenture of up to \$2,000,000 may be advanced in the future.

The East Gate local improvement has not been completed. An additional debenture of up to \$5,000,000 may be advanced in the future.

#### 18. Contingent liability

The municipality is a member of the Alberta Municipal Insurance Exchange (MUNIX). Under the terms of the membership, the municipality could become liable for its proportionate share of any claim losses in excess of the funds held by the exchange. Any liability incurred would be accounted for as a current transaction in the year the losses are determined.

#### 19. Financial instruments

The Town's financial instruments consist of cash and temporary investments, accounts receivable, investments, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, deposit liabilities, and long term debt. It is management's opinion that the Town is not exposed to significant interest or currency risks arising from these financial instruments.

The Town is subject to credit risk with respect to taxes and grants in place of taxes receivables and trade and other receivables. Credit risk arises from the possibility that taxpayers and entities to which the Town provides services may experience financial difficulty and be unable to fulfill their obligations. The large number and diversity of taxpayers and customers minimizes the credit risk.

Unless otherwise noted, the carrying value of the financial instrument approximates fair value.

#### 20. Related party transactions

The Bonnyville & District Leisure Facility Corporation is a not-for-profit corporation established under the Business Corporations Act. The Town of Bonnyville owns 50% of the corporation with the remaining ownership held by the MD of Bonnyville. The total cost of the building to date is \$27,083,511 of which one-half is recorded as a capital asset for the Town of Bonnyville while the other one-half is held by the MD of Bonnyville.

The outstanding project receivable from the MD of Bonnyville totals \$nil (2012 - \$47,274). There is also a utility receivable of \$6,444 (2012 - \$3,257), general receivable of \$nil (2012 - \$13,409), general accounts payable of \$nil (2012 - \$4,371) from the Centennial Centre. The outstanding debenture totals \$1,306,562 (2012 - \$1,491,364). During the year, the Town contributed \$968,805 (2012 - \$735,150) to the Bonnyville & District Leisure Facility Corporation for the 2013 requisition and an additional \$54,762 (2012 - \$174,159) to fund their 2012 operating deficit. Included in payables is 2013 deficit funding of \$nil (2012 - \$54,762). Included in receivables is 2013 over funding of \$239,472 (2012 - \$nil).

#### 21. Prior period adjustments

The municipality has restated its financial statements to comply with the provisions of Section 3510 of the Public Sector Accounting Board Handbook, which requires governments to record local improvement receivables in their financial statements. In addition, revenue from local improvements relating to these improvements has been included in operating income. These adjustments are as follows:
